ASABE REVISES STANDARD ON COTTON GIN EMISSION ANALYSIS

ST JOSEPH, MICHIGAN— The American Society of Agricultural and Biological Engineers (ASABE) has completed standard revision ASAE S582.1 JAN2022, Cotton Gins — Method of Utilizing Emission Factors in Determining Emission Parameters.

The major revision standardizes the engineering practice associated with development of air permits for cotton gins used within the US.

The revision eliminates duplicate terminology found in both the original version of the standard and in ANSI/ASABE S588, Uniform Terminology for Air Quality. It also updates an illustration, removes extended emission factors; and includes tables reflecting new data developed from the National Cotton Ginning Emission Factor Study using Environmental Protection Agency—promulgated test methods and particle-size analyses.
